Our struggle over location of homeless a shelter at Creedmore 0.5 clearly becoming one the biggest local issues this year. I'd like to reiterate the issues involved to bring it all into focus with reality. We all bought our houses here while there was an existing state operated facility mantal Creedmore. There have been some problems over years, but we all knew of the hospitals purpose and needs and we lived with it without complaint. Several years state reduced its commit-Creedmore and +0 other institutions to save money and released many clients to the streets. Subsequently, the court system decided that it was the city's responsibility adequate provide housing for the homeless in cold weather. decision called for prompt action; on the eve Thanksgiving the Governor unilaterally directed the use of Creedmore and other facilities as shelters for homeless men. The plan was implemented over the immediate and strenous objections of the local commaccepted 2.5 relatively secure mental

hospital has suddenly been turned into a home for people who are certified mentally ill but now given no treatment or oversight.

The Governor's action places in jeopardy the safety of our quiet little neighborhood and it makes useless the beautiful field Little League from the directly across hospital. Our stores are affected and parents are affraid. We want action, we demand the security we always had. I strongly the following immediate actions and I request the community's support for whatever demonstrations have. First, I suggest that the shelter be closed April 1 concurrent with the beginning of Little League season and clients returned to city. that clients Secondly wishing to return daily to the city be bused directly downtown and finally that whenever the shelter is open, a 24 hour police quard be established at the gate to return our peace of mind.
