The BCCA has been continuously active since 1972 and we represent the community on the Queens Civic Congress, 105 Precinct Community Council, Community Board 13, and the Bellerose Business District.

Safety And Security

Personal Safety Tips — in order to increase your personal safety you should: avoid being a target; increase your awareness; trust your instincts; and be prepared for your day with safety in mind. In particular, always keep your purse, wallet or briefcase securely near your body. Walk in well lit areas avoid deserted blocks and seek a safe location if you feel threatened. While driving keep your windows rolled up and doors locked, check the car for flats, make sure you have enough gas and be watchful. Head for the nearest police station or fire house if necessary. Always park in well lit areas, close and lock the windows and doors and don't leave any valuables visible. When you arrive home have your keys ready, be sure your entry area is well lit and immediately close and lock the door behind you. While at home keep your doors and windows locked, and don't let any strangers in the house. If a stranger has an emergency keep him or her out of the House and dial 911 for them.

Safeguard Your Car— Always use your theft deterrent devices, keep doors and windows locked and park in well lighted areas. Visit the precinct for a free window etching, or CAT (Combat Auto Theft) or similar sticker available at the precinct. Car and house alarms are very effective but make sure they are well-maintained.

Prevent Identity Theft — Shred all your bills, credit card receipts, credit applications, bank statements, and expired charge cards, etc. Do not carry your Social Security card or give out your number to anyone. Order a free credit report each year (watch out for scams). Immediately sign all new credit cards, do not carry unnecessary credit cards. When you are on-line always be very cautious giving out credit card information and look for the lock icon at the bottom of the screen. Avoid "phishing" e-mails and offers that seem too good to be true.

Safeguard Your House—The police department offers many useful suggestions for securing your house. It is very important is to use secure doors with dead bolt locks with the one inch bolt and pick resistant locks. It is strongly suggested to use a licensed locksmith. Strike plates should use 3 inch wood screws. On windows NYPD recommends using additional locks than the normal Crescent lock, particularly "pinning" the top of the lower sash through to the upper with 5/16" eye bolts. Sliding doors have similar problems that should be addressed. Perimeter lighting is suggested and use timers inside when you are away. Burglar alarms are help-ful, but get estimates and understand their operation before selecting.

Support at the precinct—The 105 has a crime prevention officer who has been to many of our meetings. Brochures are available with much more detail on each of these topics. In addition, they offer a free security audit of your home. Call 718-776-9207 for info, brochures, CAT decals, scheduling etching or home audits.


Miscellaneous

Going Green in Queens—This third annual event will be held on March 27 from 8:30am to 1:00pm in Al Oerter Recreation Center at 131-40 Fowler Avenue in Flushing (http://www.nycgovparks.org/facilities/ recreationcenters). This is a City run health and fitness center and it is magnificent. A year's registration of \$50 gets access to all facilities, or for \$75 you get access also to the spectacular indoor pool across the street. Seniors over 55 get the center and pool for only \$10 per year. Going Green in Queens is hosted by Queens Coalition for Parks and Green Spaces and several other parks and environmental groups. There will be lectures, presentations, information kiosks and demonstrations. Anyone interested in environmental issues or finding out what's going on in our Queens parks should take advantage of this free event. Over 800 people are expected. Parking is free. Check the above website for directions to the Oerter Center.

dotNeighborhoods—In about a year there should be something new on the Internet. Thanks to civic activists in Queens, a new Top Level Domain (TLD, like com, org, edu, etc.) will soon be authorized for New York City— .nyc. This will allow almost unlimited web addresses. In our area, for example, we can expect www.bellerose.nyc as a domain, which would include information on where we are, how to get here, store directories, demographics, houses of worship, etc. Links to civic groups, churches and business will also be subdomains. To access the BCCA website, a shortcut might be bcca.bellerose.nyc. Besides great convenience, there would be great revenue opportunities for the City, or perhaps to an organization operating each domain.

Sailing, anyone?—Is anyone interested in learning how to sail, but not knowing where to go or what cost. The American Small Craft Association, or TASCA (www.sailtasca.org) is an all volunteer organization teaching basic sailing in Flushing Meadows Park for only \$275, with membership and access to free advanced training and our 28' and 31' boats on Long Island Sound. Space is available for 7 on the water classes on our 14.5' sloops starting around June 1. Over 200 active members, from 16 to 80, enjoy this great sport affordably.
