LIBRARY BUS

Free bus service to the Queens Village Library at

94-11 117th Street, Queens Village is now available to residents of Bellerose.

The schedule is: Tuesday 1-8, Thursday 11-6, Saturday 10-4. Bus starts at 250th Street and Hillside Avenue (location of the unopened Bellerose branch) east on Hillside to Little Neck Parkway; southeast on Little Neck Parkway to Jericho Turnpike (Jamaica Avenue); west on Jamaica Avenue to 217th St.; north to the branch. Returns north on 217th Street to Hillside Avenue to 250th Street.

This is hardly a satisfactory solution. The Bellerose Library branch must be opened. Writing to Matthew Troy, the Mayor states that "at this time there are no funds available to open the Bellerose branch library." Yet, the Bellerose branch has been completed since 1975. On the other hand, the Ozone Park branch, just recently completed has been opened. Not only that, but \$10,000 additional was found to repair fire damage sustained before the branch was scheduled to open. We do not begrudge Ozone Park its branch library.

What we do not under-

stand is what rules are being applied. We should not be unduly surprised with the response from City Hall. We, in Bellerose know from experience that being furthest geographically from City Hall we are the last to receive any attention. It would be logical to assume, that in an election year, residents in the Bellerose area will remember who listened and who turned a deaf ear.

Another obstacle to the opening of the Bellerose branch must be the Director of the Queens Borough Public Library system. As quoted in the Long Island Press (March 6, 1977) Byam said, "When I was in Brooklyn, I never felt we had to build all the branches we did, and that's even truer in Queens. I know that this is objectionable to some people, but that's the way I feel personnally."

SERVICE CUTS

With the service cuts that the Metropolitan Transit Authority will put into effect in April, Bellerose will once again get it in the neck.

The two bus lines that serve this area, the Q36 (Jamaica Avenue to the 165th Street Terminal) and the Q43 (Long Island Rail Road Station on Sutphin Boulevard to Hillside Avenue to the City Line) are scheduled to undergo a ten percent reduction.

On arriving at the 179th Street Subway Station, users of public transportation will find that they will have to run to catch the shorter trains which the MTA admits "This is not to say that the trains are not crowded. They are."

The City administration claims that it is adopting new programs and attitudes to help retain the middle class in the City. The fact is that it is exactly this type of reduction in service that diminishes the quality of life in New York. It is the now familiar story of paying more and receiving less. The sad thing is that those who are being punished are the very people who use public transportation, not those who have given up on the bus es and subways.

Loyal as one might be to New York City, those who live in the Bellerose area near the Nassau border find themselves looking eastward "toward the Island" to shop and work as the City continues to lay hardships upon us.

Also, since most suspicious activity usually takes place in the back of the house, in the yard, or the garage, it would be helpful when reporting any suspicious activity to know the exact address of the property that is back to back with

your own.
