BELLEROSE CITIZENS SHOULD BE CONCERNED !

There are many problems which will be facing our community in the coming year which all of us should be cognizant of and should cooperate with our Civic Association in seeking favorable solutions.

Of primary interest is the current proposal for reevaluation of all property and reassessment at 100% of market value.

If this is followed through to its conconclusion as ordered by the State Court, a single family homeowner in Queens, particularly in the Bellerose area, could be faced with as much as a 100% increase in taxes. There has been legislation introduced in the State Legislature which would allow our property taxes to remain at the current level. Action on this legislation has been blocked and there are various task forces and state committees reviewing the problem. Since there is very little coverage in the media of this issue, you should all know that while this "study and review" continues, the City is preparing to institute a

program of reevaluation and reassessment.

Your Civic Association is following this problem very closely and is in contact with the various State and Local authorities. However. you, as individual homeowners and taxpayers can lend your support. We are uring you to write to Governor Carey requesting positive action on this problem at the current legislature and supporting legislation that would permit our property taxes to remain at the current level.

A second problem is the proposed cuts in the City budget which will seriously affect services in our community. One very attráctive feature of the Bellerose community is the presence of an elementary school in the heart of our association boundaries. If the mayor's proposed cuts in the education budget are followed through, this could have serious effects on the continued existence of P.S. 133. I am sure you all realize that one of the things that keeps our community viable as a desirable location for younger fam-

ilies to reside is the existence of two excellent schools, one maintained by St. Gregory's, and the other - P.S. 133. The closing of P.S. 133 would seriously affect our property values. Again it is suggested that you indicate your desire for this school to remain open by writing directly to Nicholas Garufis, the President of Community School Board 26, at their district offices at P.S. 179; also, by writing to your City Councilman, Sheldon Leffler, expressing your concern over budget cuts since any budget cuts are bound to affect essential services such as police, fire and sanitation.




