#### PRESIDENT'S GAVEL

It's hard to believe that two years have passed since my first Gavel. It's been an exciting and stimulating time and I feel gratified that some things have been accomplished during my tenure. I started this year by promising in the January Action News that we would strive for more attendance at our meetings and that we would have a suitable Fiftieth Anniversary celebration. While we had a few rough meetings, attendance at our last several meetings has been up sharply. Our Anniversary Block Party was a lot of fun despite two downpaurs. In addition, we were successful in getting the City to admit to the need for a traffic light at Little Neck Pkwy; continued our fight against the cruel and inappropriate treatment of the homeless at Creedmore Shelter and played some small role in closing the shelter permanently; we continue to sit on the Advisory Board for the RCCA Center for homeless mentally impaired at Creedmore; we've gotten the City to investigate the condition of our local streets for possible reconstruction and we've come to the aid of several residents by

presenting various issues before the Community Board and the City Planning Commission.

In general, I've strengthened my own belief in the value of this Civic Association but I'm very disappointed in the general apathy and lack of interest on the part of most people in our own community and throughout the area. While attendance at meetings has improved, we only get about thirty people out of TWELVE HUNDRED FAMILIES at our meetings, and most of these people are the same each month. The success of a civic association relies on a constant flow of new ideas, attention to the problems of the community and most importantly, input from a broad range of people. In other words members, it's up to you to bring vital issues to our attention!

I would like to thank the members of the Board, especially Bob Costagliola, Lorraine Anzalone, Bernie Wechsler and our Treasurer Ross Fertitta for their interest. support and assistance over the past two years. I hope that the progress we've made since our reorganization ten years ago will continue and that the community involves themselves more

#### USED MOTOR OIL

Many of us don't give it a second thought about discarding used motor oil when we change the oil in our cars. Some fill cans or bottles and place them with other garbage, while others dump the oil down sewers. In both cases, the oil is gone from sight and never seems to be a problem. However, it is a problem - an environmental problem. The waste oil eventually winds up on the surface of some local body of water to become an oil sheen that interferes with wildlife, fish, and other aquatic organisms.

A current New York State regulation requires all service stations that change oil for its customers to accept up to 5 gallons of used oil from any person. For the most part many stations do not comply, but this is changing. Service stations that do not comply and also, individuals who improperly discard used oil can be fined for up to \$1000 and a year in jail.

Find out more about the state regulations and how you can properly dispose of used oil, by attending the next Bellerose Community Board meeting. Charles Tozzo, one of our local residents, will inform you of the facts and what proper actions to take. We are looking forward to seeing you.
