HOUSE OF HOPE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH Corner of 248 ST. & 85th Avenue

Where Bellerose Worships

As our next installment in this series, we will take a look at the history of St. Gregory the Great Roman Catholic Church.

Early in the 1930's, the Catholics in the Queens and North Floral Park section of Bellerose and those in the Nassau section of Bellerose worshipped at Our Lady of Lourdes in Queens Village or at Our Lady of Victory in Floral Park. Glen Oaks then did not exist. The first priests to say Mass in this area lived at the home of the parents of the late Dr. Brian Gallagher at Commonwealth Boulevard and 90th Ave. Here, as well as at a store on Jericho Turnpike, Mass was offered until the congregation grew too large to be accomodated. The Bellerose Theater was then utilized, while the priests remained in residence at the Gallagher home.

The Parish of St. Gregory the Great was formally begun in December of 1936 by the late Reverend William McLaughlin. The cornerstone of the church building on 88th Road and 242 Street was laid in March of 1937. The house next to the Church was acquired as an annex and here the priests lived until the Rectory was completed. The cornerstone of the

Rectory was laid in 1940.

When the Cross Island Parkway was scheduled for construction through church property, it was with the express understanding that a tunnel would be built providing walking access to the eventually expanded

St. Gregory facilities.

Religious instruction was given to the children on Sunday mornings in the basement of the Church (the Oak Room) by a group of Sisters living in West Hempstead who travelled to Bellerose once a week to

perform their duties.

With the opening of the school in 1953 on the east side of Cross Island Parkway, the Sisters of the Blessed Virgin Mary moved into the Church annex west of Cross Island Parkway where they remained until the Convent was built. Sister Regina Delaney is Principal of the school of 790 students, now staffed by the Ursuline Sisters and lay personnel.

The needs of the school and the continued growth of the parish were further served by the addition of Gregorian Hall in 1966. This building was awarded second prize in construction by the Queens Chamber of Commerce.

The second pastor sent to St. Gregory's was the Reverend Daniel Halloran who remained until his death in June of 1966. The Reverend Edward J. McLaughlin, no relation to the founding pastor, is the third and present pastor of the parish. Assisting him in the administration of his priestly duties to the 2,700 families of the congregation are the Reverends Edward J. McGinness, John A. McShane, and Alfred P. LoPinto. At this writing Father McGinness is preparing to take up duties as pastor of St. Helen's Church, Howard Beach, after nine and a half years at St. Gregory's.

Today, the parish of St. Gregory's, divided by Cross Island Parkway, is fairly extensive within its somewhat irregular boundaries. To the north, Union Turnpike is the boundary where it meets Winchester Boulevard to the west. To the east it extends to the city line in Floral Park while along the south Jamaica Avenue is its boundary. In actuality, some of the parishoners live in Nassau County, south of Jericho Turnpike.

The church and community activities of St. Gregory's are numerous and varied. They include: Nocturnal Adoration Society; Holy Name Society; Rosary Society; Altar Society; Al-Anon; Al-Teen; Catholic Daughters of America; Athletic Association (sports program for youth of the community); Leisure Club (Senior Citizens of St. Gregory's, Holy Trinity, House of Hope); Adult Club; Bowling Leagues (two-Men/Women); Prayer Group; Cub Scouts; and Girl Scouts.

Two sister Civic Associations——
The Creedmore Civic Association and
the Bellerose—Hillside Civic Assoc—
iation——hold their meetings at St.

Gregory's.

My thanks to Father LoPinto for his help in assembling the facts on this history of St. Gregory's, and also to Miss Nancy Doyle for her patience in answering my questions.

TRUCK ROUTES THROUGH BELLEROSE

The plan to re-route delivery trucks through Queens has been made public and is expected to be implemented soon.

Community Board 13, which covers the B.C. C.A. area objected to the proposed changes for Union Turnpike and Hillside Avenue but were overruled by the borough planners. However, the proposal to make Little Neck Parkway a truck route, to which Community Board 13 and the B.C.C.A. also objected, was withdrawn. Not a complete victory, but our voices were heard.

Intended to remove heavy trucks from local streets, the "Detroit dinosaurs" will be permitted to use the following streets in the Bellerose area as through truck routes:
