LIBRARY TITLE

The Queens Borough
Public Library finally
assumed responsibility
for the Bellerose
Branch Library Building on December 7,1977.
According to Milton
Byam, Director of the
QBPL, the Library has
already begun its preparations for installation of equipment and
books. Byam is optimistic that he will
meet his March 1978
opening goal.

The building at 250-06
Hillside Avenue, was
completed on September
16, 1975. In December,
1975, QBPL trustees
advised the N.Y.C.
Department of Public
Works that the QBPL
could not accept responsibility for the building due to the lack
of operating funds.

Continuing vandalism led to the boarding up of the building in March, 1976.

In December, 1976, the Department of Real Estate was seeking a final disposition of the unused building which had to be maintained by the City. Deputy Mayor Zuccotti denied

that the building would be used as a recertification center for mothers of children attending welfare sponsored day care centers. And the building continued to be an eyesore, with campaign posters, advertisements and graffitti on its walls.

Continuing pressure from the community led QBPL trustees to hold a special meeting with civic and elected leaders. The trustees then voted to take title to the building by Nov. 1977 and open it as a library by March, 1978.

Graffitti still remains despite our requests for its removal. When the Department of Public Works had the responsibility of maintaining the building, it claimed it had no funds to remove graffitti, and that removal of litter and debris was the duty of the Dept. of Sanitation.

Requests to that agency went unanswered. Thanks to members of the BCCA who gave of their time, weeds, litter and other debris were occasionally removed from in front of the building. The community has waited approximately 25 years for a library. That wait should be over in a few short weeks.

RESPONSIBILITY

HOME OWNERS RESPONSIBILITY

Once again winter is upon us and soon we will have the usual sleet and snow, This is a reminder to the community, that we have a responsbility to our neighbors to clear our sidewalks. The law specifies that 4 hours after the storm stops your sidewalk (except after 12 midnight then in the morning) uld be cleared . You could receive a citation (ticket) for nonremoval of snow or not sanding of ice. If this is not enough should someone fall on your sidewalk and then a law suit.

Last year was a disgrace the condition of some of the sidewalks I had to use walking home. An older person would have had serious difficulty manuvering on some that I crossed. Surely there is one adult or teenage child in every home who could take care of this job. People with heart conditions whould take care not to over work and if need be hire a neighborhood teenager to clear the snow.

ADULT FILMS

Community pressure is having some success in its battle against "Adult" or pornographic films. Right now only one movie house in Queens Village consistently shows "X" rated films.

While there has been some success, the fact is that more pickets are needed to continue the pressure. Volunteers, even if they can devote only two or three hours, should get in touch with the St. Anne's Knights of Columbus in Queens Village.

Some movie house operators show "Adult" films because there seems to be a market for the product, others are driven in this direction, since as business men, they have payrolls to meet, business and real estate taxes to pay.

Porno films are made on a low budget, and film rentals are low so that the theatre operator can meet his financial obligations more easily. Multi-million dollars films carry rentals in the thousands of dollars.

In some areas, there is not enough community support for family-type films, the "G" or "GP" rated movies. The options for the theatre operator are very few --- keep the theatre open with "X" films, or shutter the theatre and hope that vandals won't begin to tear it down.

Motion picture house attendance is diminishing. With baseball, hockey, good old movies (Paper Moon was re-run again last night) series like "Upstairs-Downstairs" available free by selecting the right TV channel the practive of going to the movies is disappearing.
