

After publication of last month's Newsletter, we asked Assemblyman Doug Prescott to join us in December. Doug spoke to us about his activities in Albany and of his local offices' activities. He has been extremely active since returning to Albany and is introducing new legislation to help his constituents. Doug had called me about the delay on installing the light and within two weeks the light was hooked up and working. We had a presentation from Charles Tozzo about recent laws requiring gas stations with service facilities to accept used crankcase oil from anyone who wants to recycle it. Many times I have seen people dumping oil in sewers knowing that this can do considerable damage to the environment. Charles suggests we all us this new right to save a lot of money by doing our own oil changes (which takes about 5 minutes) and bring the used oil to the station for safe, ecological disposal.


