

According to the Chinese lunar calendar, this is the "Year of the Pig". Festivities commence on New Year's Eve, February 7th, when families congregate for sumptuous dinners, gifts are exchanged and choice delicacies are blessed and offered before the portrait of ancestors. At midnight, dancers parading mammoth paper dragons begin to snake their way through the narrow winding streets of Chinatown. Symbol of guardianship and vigilance, the dragon has always held a revered position in the history of the Chinese people.

One of the highlights of the New Year's day festivities is the colorful parade which starts at noon, huge lions, each belonging to a Chinese family association, unicorns and a drum corps from the local Chinese school will wend their way along the streets, stopping to wish residents and tourists Kung hee fat choy', which is "Happy New Year" in Chinese. The entire section echoes from exploding firecrackers and by night, the glow from the rockets and Roman candles lends a mysterious air to the charming Oriental colony. Another highlight of this year's celebration, according to the New York Convention and Visitors Bureau, will be the appearance of the cast of 'Flower Drum Song', one of Broadway's hit musicals.




