

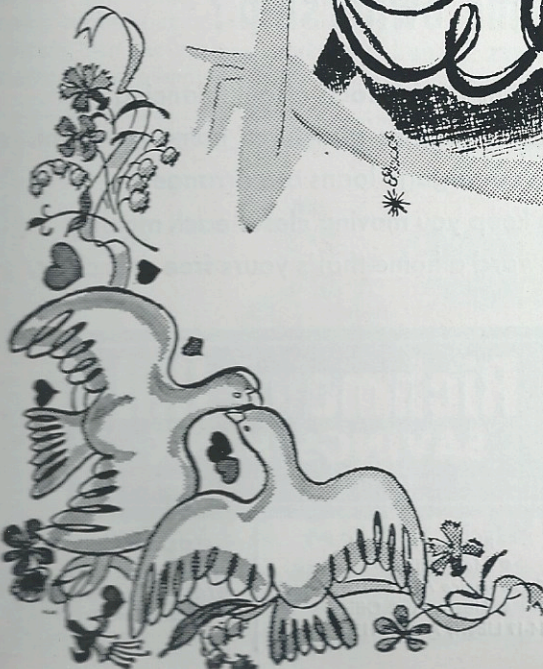

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## NEW YORK CITY'S CHINATOWN TO CELEBRATE "YEAR OF THE PIG" FEBRUARY 8th

For more than 4000 years, the first day of the first new moon has marked the start of the Chinese New Year. This year, the event falls on February 8th and New York City's Chinatown, will welcome in their year 4657 in the ancient tradition of feasting and parades.

According to the Chinese lunar calendar, this is the "Year of the Pig". Festivities commence on New Year's Eve, February 7th, when families congregate for sumptuous dinners, gifts are exchanged and choice delicacies are blessed and offered before the portrait of ancestors. At midnight, dancers parading mammoth paper dragons begin to snake their way through the narrow winding streets of Chinatown. Symbol of guardianship and vigilance, the dragon has always held a revered position in the history of the Chinese people.

One of the highlights of the New Year's day festivities is the colorful parade which starts at noon, huge lions, each belonging to a Chinese family association, unicorns and a drum corps from the local Chinese school will wend their way along the streets, stopping to wish residents and tourists 'Kung hee fat choy', which is "Happy New Year" in Chinese. The entire section echoes from exploding firecrackers and by night, the glow from the rockets and Roman candles lends a mysterious air to the charming Oriental colony. Another highlight of this year's celebration, according to the New York Convention and Visitors Bureau, will be the appearance of the cast of 'Flower Drum Song', one of Broadway's hit musicals.

There are more than 50,000 Chinese living in New York. Of these, approximately 7,000 live in Chinatown, a 30 acre area in lower Man-

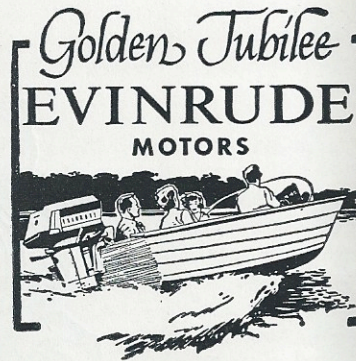

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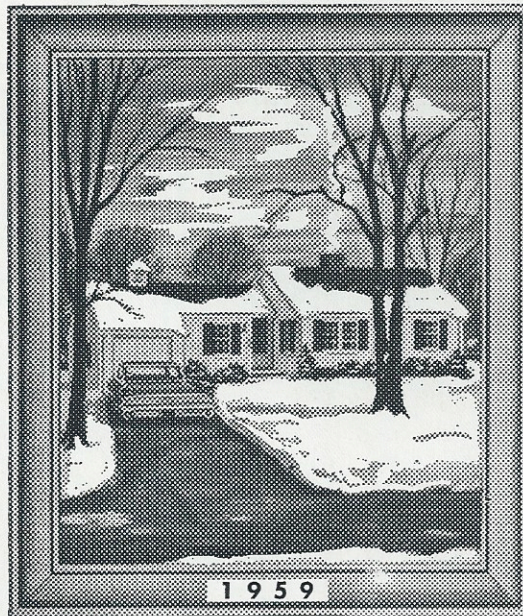

# SCHOOL DAYS

## A SECOND LOOK

Classes are now well into the second semester of the school year and it's time parents took a second long hard look at the academic progress of their school age children. A small portion of the school population will be looking forward to graduation and the selections of schools in which to pursue higher education. The majority of pupils will be simply looking forward to promotion.

In the not too distant past, promotion was an automatic procedure for ninety-nine and nine tenths of any student body, the theory being that a child should remain with his peers, chronically speaking. No thought was given to a possible moral obligation the pupil owed his government or his parents, namely the responsibility of learning as much as he could while in school. As a result a large number of pupils became indifferent and careless in their work, while others developed into school loafers, who went to class for laughs and to keep warm in winter. They didn't give a hoot whether or not they learned anything for they knew they would automatically be promoted.

As trite as it may seem to say so, the worm—in the person of the general public—turned, when it became aware that a lot of lunkheads and know-nothings were being turned out of school with diplomas into the business and trade world; lazy, sloppy and almost il-

literate workers. This, coupled with the jolt educators got from other sources concerning educational standards and methods employed elsewhere started a new trend in this country and a little over a year ago literally thousands of children were refused graduation or compelled to repeat a grade because they were two or more years academically retarded.

Parents who do not want their children held over at the end of this school year should make a timely check upon the scholastic achievements of their youngsters. There are two handy mediums through which parents may do this. The first is through a careful study of the report card and the second is a close inspection of the homework assignments given pupils.

The report card is the teacher's appraisal of the child's work and at the same time is a running record of the pupils achievement compiled for the benefit of the parent. Critical examination should be given this report by the parent for it gives him an opportunity to call his youngster to account for failures or for showing insufficient progress in school work. Getting a passing rating is a great achievement for some pupils, but for many, especially the very bright, it is no special achievement at all. The brighter the child the higher should be the rate of achievement demanded by the parent. If the parent does not understand the rating system of the school, the teachers and administrators are al-

ways ready to give help and guidance through parent-teacher conferences. There is no valid excuse for a parent not understanding a report card or failing to make use of it as a criteria with which to interpret the scholastic achievement of his child.

The quality of the work a child puts into his homework assignment is an indicator of the quality of his work in the classroom. Few parents take time out to closely inspect homework. Most seem satisfied if the youngster says he did his homework or that no homework was assigned. There is no doubt about the fact that correcting homework is a time consuming chore for the parent and compelling a child to do it over again often occasions a struggle and even a fracas between parent and child. Nevertheless no child should be permitted by his parent to hand in careless writing and incorrect

answers for homework. It is better the struggle take place at home and not in the classroom. If parents cooperate in the matter of inspecting homework the pupil will no doubt get a few commendations in class, which in turn will inspire him to try to do better work and leave the teacher's time free for teaching instead of having to be wasted in futile attempts to get some pupils to improve.

Homework assignments and report cards should therefore be the mediums through which all parents should attempt to induce their school-age children to strive for greater academic achievement. Such activity on the part of the parent will pay off in unlimited scholastic dividends for the child.

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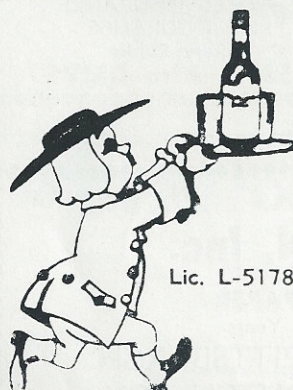
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## ACTIVITIES AT ST. GREGORY'S
