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
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HOME STUDY

Only the expectant student, who is a lover of books and knowledge will do the follow up studying of his own volition. Often he's the student who needs it the least. Those who need it the most will find a score of reasons for not looking at their books in the evening. Too often it's a television program or an evening date that keeps the pupil from his books.

Studying text books at home has several advantages. It is bound to help the student know his subject matter better and increases his ratings. It helps him become better acquainted with books. The pupil who learns how to use his text books at home becomes more resourceful in seeking knowledge. Many other advantages could be

Parents should examine text books brought home by their children. To train the pupil in the use of these books at home it would be well for the parent to question the child as to the topis studied in class. The child should then be asked by the parent to point out the topic in the text before attempting to study. To add variety the parent might ask the child to read the text aloud, then discuss the topic with him. This would give the youngster a chance to show off what he knows and give him a little added pride in his scholastic achievement.

All the exhortation in the world by teachers concerning homework is of little avail unless parents cooperate in the matter. It is the obligation of a parent to require the child to sit down in the evening with his books. At least a half hour's study should be demended before the child is allowed any sort of diversion or entertainment.


Muskingum College Choir Presents Sacred Music Concert at United Presbyterian Church.
