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ANNUAL BELLEROSE REASSESSMENT 1985

Homeowners in Bellerose received their annual official notice from the Bureau of Real Property Assessment on the day after the BCCA monthly meeting in February.

Starting in 1982, the City of N.Y. began reassessing all homeowners with a 6% annual increase and will not stop until they reach the legal limit of not more than 20% increase over a 5 year period.

The books of the Tentative Assessment Roll are available for inspection at 90-25 Sutphin Blvd. The office is open until 10 p.m. on Tuesdays, through March 15. To fight the increase, the homeowner has to fill out an application for correction of tentative assessed valuation. After the Tax Commissioner, with or without a personal hearing, turns you down and does not give you the yellow form, Offer of Reduction, you must go to the SCAR procedure.

For a refundable (if you win) fee of \$25 you file a petition for Small Claims Assessment Review. The records show that while only a few homeowners file for the SCAR informal hear-

ing, almost every homeowner wins and the increase is rescinded.

Come to the next BCCA meeting on Thursday, March 7th, and let your neighbors know how you feel about these 6% tax increases every year.

Once again, I'd like to thank the Kunis family for sharing their memorover the past four decades. Here is another installment of their experiences. We have some additional articles to be published in future aditions but we'd be delighted to hear from more of you.

Living in Bellerose cont'd by Rena Garter Kunis.....

We couldn't have afforded a car if there had been cars to buy. Holding my three-yearold by the hand, I pushed the carriage containing the new baby to the neares the magnolia blossoms, grocery, whose stock and prices resembled today's supermarket facilities as little as a horse and wagon resemble a jet plane. As we learned our way around, we discovered an A&P a few blocks farther on, and a privately-owned supermarket where we could charge our purchases and pay for them monthly as my husband's check came.

When Spring arrived that first year, we invited sundry relatives to admire our new home. My uncle, the financial wizard of the family, looked it over and commented, "What kind of time is this to buy a house? In a few months they'll be building homes with solar heating and all kinds of modern improvements." Then he examined the three bedrooms, all with cross ventilation, (that was

important before the days of ubiquitous air conditioning), the living room, the dining room and kitchen, the baseies of living in Bellerose ment, the storage attic-all of which we had thought so spacious -and added, "This is a doll house. How can you live in such a tiny place?

> Despite all those discouraging experiences, we loved our house. We planted daffodil and tulip bulbs. most of which the squirrels ate before they had a chance to bloom. Even that didn't faze us. If squirrels could live free here, it must be a good place to raise children. We rejoiced at the golden forsythia, the dogwood, the crabapple blossoms which greeted the Spring, and the roses of all varieties that bloomed from June all through summer. In the Fall, the asters and zinnias we had planted so optimistically really did bloom, in a profusion of colors. And when Winter came again, the snow reflected myriad holiday lights which blossomed like flowers. throughout the neighborhood.

A few months after we had taken possession of our new abode, a real estate agent arrived at our front door with an offer of \$17,500 for our home. Real estate values were soaring. A 70% profit on our investment was appealing, but we were wise enough to realize that if we were to accept, we'd have to pay still more for suitable living quarters.

At last count. houses in our neighborhood are going for over \$125,000. We're still not selling.

NON SOLICITATION ORDER

This means that Real Estate Brokers or agents are banned from soliciting the sale of houses or apartment rental in any way; whether by advertisement, personal call or visit. This order by the Secretary of State was issued in 1973 to prevent any rapid shift in population that may radically change the structure and economic fibre of various neighborhoods in the city.

Please be vigilant about any solicitation, keep a copy of any ad or business card and call Richard Hellenbrecht at 343-5397 to report any such illegal activity. The Secretary of State has recently resolved one case as reported last year and I was called upon to testify recently regarding a second case involving Pennysaver ads. I have reported another broker for putting business cards in mail boxes. These activities leave the impression on some homeowners that our neighborhood is weakening. I am very proud to say to anyone that I live in Bellerose. have a strong, beautiful neighborhood: Let's all fight to keep it that wav.

TOTAL PATROL CONCEPT

The 105th Pct. has recently incorporated a foot patrol program covering certain neighborhood areas. The object of the program is to get the patrol officers to be closer to the community.
