COMMUNITY BOARD HEARING

On Thursday, Oct. 3, at 7 p.m. at House of Hope Church basement (248 St. and 85th Ave) Community Board 13 (C.B. 13) will be holding a public hearing.

The first item on the agenda is the suggestion of a Bellerose resident that the !12A bus make a U-turn at its terminus at 87 Drive and Little Neck Parkway. The existing southbound bus route includes a turn onto 87th Ave., to 253 St. and then onto 87 Drive to Little Neck Pkwy. where it begins its trip north. The U-turn just above the old "hump" was suggested to eliminate the use of the side streets.

The request for an extension of variance by the Amoco gas station at 248-55 Jamaica Ave. is the second item on the agenda. In 1960 a 15 year variance was obtained to permit the gas station to operate at that location which was in a Retail Use Zoning District. In 1974, the term was extended to January 1985. Community Board 13 must make a recommendation concerning the extension to the N.Y.C. Board of Standards and Appeals.

C.B. invites comments from the community at the October 3 hearing on the above items. They will then be discussed by Board members at a future meeting of C.B. 13. Any comments

can also be made in writing to C.B. 13 Chairperson Susan Noreika or area chairman James Delaney at the C.B. office at 219-41 Jamaica Ave. Queens Village.

If you plan to attend the hearing, please be prompt, as it precedes the regular October meeting of the BCCA.

WARNING TO HOMEOWNERS (courtesy of Queens Colony Civic Assoc.)

Nassau County District Attorney Denis Dillon warned homeowners to be on the guard against home improvement companies operating on Long Island. They have received numerous complaints about contractors who perform inferior work or not work after a deposit is given. "If homeowners remember a few basic rules before hiring a contractor, we could greatly reduce the number of complaints."

-First, the homeowner should check to make sure the contractor is licensed by the County Consumers Affairs Office;

-Demand references other jobs, local suppliers - then give them
a call!

-Is he licensed or bonded? check it out.

-Know where to find himaddress, phone, license number, etc.

-If your remodeler is a Construction Company, who's really in charge? Will the work be subcontracted? To Whom? Get the facts!

-Finally, make sure all the promises are in writing: work to be done, quality of materials, total cost, completion time, etc.

Remember, take your time, you don't have to sign today. Know what you're signing: a mortgage? a loan contract? a promissory note? job contract? completion certificate? (this document means the job is finished, so never sign it until it is complete.) Read it all and keep copies of all papers.


