#### CREEDMORE SHELTER

Another great success of combined community action is the final closing of the men's shelter at Creedmore effective July 1, 1985. Thanks to our many demonstrations, parades and letters, and to the constant pressure by Senator Padavan and our other elected officials, the City and State finally decided to use the hospital facilities exclusively for people in need of mental health assistance and receiving such aid on a 24 hour basis. Civic Association officers have been at several meetings at the hospital and while there are many problems to be ironed out, they are much less severe than before July 1. We are committed, along with several other local civic groups, to continue the liaison group that has been meeting with management of the RCCA (Residential Care Center for Adults) as we have been for the last year and a half to assure that the needs of the community are met.
